Since 1955, passionate, conservative women, just like you, have joined the Texas Federation of Republican Women to become involved and influence the direction of this great state.


Nowadays there are so many ways to become politically active. So why do thousands of women each year choose to join TFRW clubs?

One mom works through tragedy to make police better

We hear a lot about mistrust of police these days. And Jeanine Wehby certainly has cause to be bitter. Instead, she gives us a fine example of making police better.

Jeanine is a can-do, plain-spoken sort who has been a fixture in East Dallas and Lake Highlands civic circles for decades. She seems younger than her 83 years. She has also known more than her share of sorrow. Her husband and two sons all died too young. But it's the death of younger son Keith that won't let her rest.

The one she describes as her adventurer and free spirit saw his life crumble after the suicide of his wife in 2004. "He just crashed," she said. "He cried and sobbed for one year." A depression descended that he could not shake in spite of significant mental-health treatment. In the spring of 2008, a neighbor reported to police that Keith talked of guns and violence. An officer and a mental-health specialist went to Keith's Old East Dallas home.

"I'm sure Keith was ugly to them," his mother said. "He did not want to go to Parkland."

In the immediate aftermath of his wife's suicide, Keith was restrained and carried to the psychiatric unit there. Though he was quickly released, the setting terrified him, Jeanine said. On the evening of April 1, 2008, police returned to the house with a mental-illness warrant for his detention. Things quickly escalated into a standoff, with SWAT officers surrounding the house. A neighbor called Jeanine to tell her what was happening. "I got to his street and there were a dozen police cars, an ambulance and SWAT trucks," she said.

She was stopped by an officer at the outermost perimeter, almost a block from her son's home. Despite her pleas, she was not allowed to go any closer or talk to anyone in charge. "I think I could have helped. I could have given them the phone number of his psychiatrist. I could have told them that it's just Parkland he feared. He might have been willing to go somewhere else," Jeanine said. Instead, all she could do was stand in the street, feeling angry and helpless as officers began bashing in doors and firing tear gas into the house.

"Keith took his life at 10:20. I heard the shot," she said.

Still, she was kept away until after 1 a.m. "I got up to the house and I saw them roll Keith out," she said.

The very next day, Jeanine went to work. She was determined to change police policy. "I didn't want this to happen to another mother," she said. Persistence eventually led to a meeting of more than an hour with then-Police Chief David Kunkle. And her efforts succeeded. Policy was changed. Procedure now calls for the police commander at such scenes to consult with family members and seek useful information.

"It's such a simple thing," Jeanine said.

In fact, the department now stresses the importance of families providing as much information as possible about a person in mental crisis — especially in a 911 call. The more officers know in advance, the better the chance of a safe and productive outcome.

Beyond changing department policy, Jeanine began regularly telling her story to Dallas officers receiving training on mental-crisis calls. And if that weren't enough, she also began to volunteer weekly as a clerk at Dallas police headquarters. For her work with Dallas police, the Dallas chapter of NAMI — the National Alliance on Mental Illness — recently honored Jeanine with its Community Support Award.

Jeanine Wehby respects the work of police officers. But she knows too well that they're not perfect. She has shown us a path for working through tragedy to make things better.
